

LETTERS

Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr. with Subcommittee Chairs and other House and Senate Leaders

September 6, 2019 – Chairman Pallone sent a letter to the Hon. Bobby Scott, Chairman of the Committee on Education and Labor, regarding H.R. 1309, the, “Workplace Violence Prevention for Health Care and Social Service Workers Act”. The letter was regarding the Committee on Energy and Commerce agreement to waive formal consideration of H.R. 1309 in order to expediate the consideration of the bill on the House floor. The Committee requested that appropriate consultation and involved as this bill or similar legislation moves forward, so that they may address any remaining issues within their jurisdiction. The letter also further requests to name the members of the Committee to any conference committee to consider such provisions, as well as a request to include this letter in the House report of the bill and in the *Congressional Record* during floor consideration of H.R. 1309.

September 10, 2019 – Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr. and Ranking Member Greg Walden sent a letter to the leaders of the House Committee on Armed Services – Chairman Adam Smith (D-WA), Ranking Member Mac Thornberry (R-TX)— and the leaders of the Senate Committee on Armed Services – Chairman Jim Inhofe (R-OK) and Ranking Member Jack Reed (D-RI) – requesting that section 214 of S. 1790 not be included in the final legislation of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2020 (NDAA). The letter stated that while they agree with the goal of balancing and efficiently using the spectrum allocated for Federal use, they believe that the NDAA is not the proper vehicle to address this complex set of issues, as it requires the input of numerous stakeholders, not just the Department of Defense (DOD). Specially, the letter requested that section 214 of the Senate-passed bill be removed from the final House-Senate NDAA agreement.

September 12, 2019 – Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr. (D-NJ), along with Chairman Peter A. DeFazio (D-OR), House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and Chair Raul M. Grijalva, House Committee on Natural Resources, sent a letter to the House Armed Services Committee Chairman Adam Smith and Ranking Member Mac Thornberry regarding S. 1760, the National Defense Authorization Act (FY 2020). The chairmen expressing their strong objections to the inclusion of section 6021 of S. 1790, the Senate-passed National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) in the final report of the NDAA, relating to the operation of the Pensacola Hydroelectric Project (FERC Project No. 1494). The section represents a deeply flawed policy that undermines key stakeholder and resource protections included in the Federal Power Act. Specifically, the areas within the hydropower licensing process, providing unprecedented exemptions to the licensee of the Pensacola Hydroelectric Project, and the Grand River Dam Authority (GRDA). The chairman argued that the NDAA should not be a vehicle for special interest provisions that undermine due process protections in the Federal Power Act, as well as the rights of their tribal communities and other citizens to engage in hydropower relicensing procedures that effect their lives, businesses, and properties.

September 16, 2019 – A letter was sent to the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Andrew Wheeler by leaders of the House Committee on Energy and Commerce, Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr., its Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations Chair Diana DeGette (D-CO), and Subcommittee on Environment and Climate Change Chairman Paul Tonko (D-NY), along with leaders of the House Committee on Science, Space, and Technology Chairwoman Eddie Bernice Johnson (D-TX), and its Subcommittee on Investigations and Oversight Chair Mikie Sherill (D-NJ). The letter warns that the committees are continuing to investigate efforts by EPA to undermine and weaken the scientific integrity of the impacts of climate change on air quality and the health of the American people. The committees are concerned about the actions EPA has taken to weaken scientific integrity in reviewing and setting National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) under the Clean Air Act (CAA). Further, the committees want to know how EPA will replace the independent panel’s scientific expertise in particulate matter and ozone, two dangerous pollutants. The letter included a series of questions for EPA to answer, as well as a request for potential meeting times to discuss these matters.

September 16, 2019- Chairman Pallone and Ranking Member Walden sent a letter to Anthony J. de Nicola, President and Managing Partner of Welsh, Carson, Anderson & Stowe, regarding an investigation into the practices surrounding medical surprise billing. The letter requests information regarding Welsh, Carson, Anderson & Stowe’s ownership, policies, and practices as it relates to third-party medical providers, particularly with the firm’s relationship with any physician staffing companies and emergency transport companies. Surprise billing leaves patients with medical bills into the thousands after inadvertently receiving care from an out-of-network provider. The letter requests that Welsh, Carson, Anderson & Stowe answer a series of questions attached to the letter, as well as provide any other relevant materials.

September 16, 2019- Chairman Pallone and Ranking Member Walden sent a letter to Henry R. Kravis and George R. Roberts, Co-Chairmen and Co-Chief Executive Officers, KKR & Co. Inc., regarding an investigation into the practices surrounding surprise billing. The letter requested information regarding KKR & Co. Inc.’s ownership, policies, and practices as it relates to third-party medical providers, particularly with the firm’s relationship with any physician staffing companies and emergency transport companies. Surprise billing leaves patients with medical bills in the thousands of dollars after they inadvertently receiving care from an out-of-network provider. The letter requests that KKR & Co., Inc., respond to a series of questions attached to the letter and provide any other relevant materials.

September 16, 2019- Chairman Pallone and Ranking Member Walden sent a letter to Stephen A. Schwarzman, Chairman, Chief Executive Officer, and Co-Founder of Blackstone regarding an investigation into the practices surrounding medical surprise billing. The letter requests information regarding Blackstone’s ownership, policies, and practices as it relates to third-party medical providers, particularly with the firm’s relationship with any physician staffing companies and emergency transport companies. Surprise billing leaves patients with medical bills in the thousands of dollars after they inadvertently receiving care from an out-of-network provider. The letter requests that Blackstone respond to a series of questions attached to this letter and provide any other relevant materials.
