CN - July 2024 Preview for the Hill: Forthcoming DFC Project CNs. The prospective DFC projects listed here are on track to be formally notified to Congress within approximately 30 days, although some projects may take longer.

CN- TRANSMITTAL No. 10-24 SECTION 2350a PROJECT REPORT FOR PROJECT AGREEMENT (PA) NUMBER A- 24-01 BETWEEN THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE OF THE REPUBLIC OF SINGAPORE CONCERNING ENHANCED USER INTERFACE FOR SWARM SOFTWARE SYSTEMS.

CN #187 - This notification is to advise that the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) intends to obligate from the Countering PRC Influence Fund \$18,000,000 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 Developmental Assistance (DA-CPIF) resources. These funds will open the supply chain through responsible mineral processing in Indonesia, strengthen

food systems in the Pacific Island Countries, counter PRC influence in critical minerals in ASEAN, advance competitive and transparent energy procurement systems in Pakistan, strengthen Sri Lanka's public financial management systems, and counter PRC media influence by promoting positive information in the Maldives. The \$18,000,000 in DA-CPIF comes from the CPIF reserve. Special notification is required for the Countering PRC Influence Fund, Indo-Pacific Strategy, and the countries of Pakistan and Sri Lanka.

CN #188 - This notification is to advise that the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) intends to obligate from the Countering PRC Influence Fund \$7,000,000 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 Developmental Assistance (DA-CPIF) resources and \$300,000 from the FY 2023 Economic Support Fund resources (ESF-CPIF). Philippines and Bangladesh.

CN #189 - This notification is to advise that the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) intends to obligate \$37,000,000 of fiscal year (FY) 2023 ESF for the Caribbean Basin Security Initiative (CBSI) using FY 2023 new obligation authority (NOA). Of this NOA, additional notification is required for \$18,052,184 due to the following: (1) ESF account level increase greater than 10 percent of the FY 2023 Congressional Budget Justification (CBJ) request level; and (2) special notification requirements related to community-based police assistance and support for administration of justice.

CN #190 - This notification is to advise that the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) intends to obligate \$1,371,099 in fiscal year (FY) 2022 DA to provide ongoing capacity building and institutional strengthening in the areas of forest and biodiversity conservation, natural resource management, forest landscapes management and restoration. Notification is required because funding will be implemented via interagency agreement subject to special notification. Development Assistance (DA) Guatemala.

CN #191 - This notification is to advise that the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) intends to obligate \$8,500,000 in fiscal year (FY) 2023 ESF made available for the Prevention and Stabilization Fund (PSF) to support the implementation of the U.S. Strategy to Prevent Conflict and Promote Stability (SPCPS) in Haiti consistent with the goals of the Global Fragility Act of 2019, pursuant to section 7066(a) of the Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 2023 (P.L. 117-328, Division K) (SFOAA).

CN #192 - This notification is to advise that the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID)'s Democracy, Human Rights, and Governance (DRG) Bureau intends to program a total of \$440,000 in fiscal year (FY) 2022 Development Assistance (DA) funds from the Private Sector Engagement (PSE) Hub in the Bureau for Inclusive Growth, Partnerships, and Innovations (IPI), formerly the Democracy, Development, and Innovation (DDI) Bureau for programming in Colombia, Egypt, Guatemala, Mexico, and the Philippines, which are special notification countries. No funding will be provided to these country governments. The funding will carry out innovative activities that promote private sector partnership in addressing transnational corruption.

CN - DFC will provide an up to 20-year, post-commercial operation date, direct loan of up to \$99,000,000 to Central Eléctrica da Namaacha (the “Borrower”) to finance the development, construction, and operations of a 120-megawatt (“MW”) wind power project in Namaacha, Mozambique (the “Project”). The Project advances U.S. economic and strategic interests by supporting African partner countries, including Mozambique, with energy security by meeting growing power demand in the country and more broadly in the Southern Africa region.

CN - DFC will provide political risk insurance with a contingent liability in an amount up to \$80,000,000 to Globeleq Africa Limited (the “Insured Investor”) to support the Insured Investor’s equity investment in Central Eléctrica da Namaacha, a special purpose vehicle formed to develop, construct, and operate a 120- megawatt (“MW”) wind power project in Namaacha, Mozambique (the “Project”). The Project advances U.S. economic and strategic interests by supporting African partner countries, including Mozambique, with energy security by meeting growing power demand in the country and more broadly in the Southern Africa region.

CN - DFC will provide technical assistance (“TA”) grant funding in an amount of up to \$1,471,802 to support the Fonds Européen de Financement Solidaire II (“FEFISOL II”) Technical Assistance Facility (“FEFISOL II TAF”) to support African microfinance institutions (“MFIs”) and agricultural small business borrowers of FEFISOL II to improve their social, environmental, and core business performance (the “TA Project”). The Grantee, Solidarite Internationale Pour Le Developpement et L’Investissement (“SIDI”), is the investment advisor to FEFISOL II and the TAF Manager. The TA Project may include assistance in Egypt, Rwanda, and Tunisia. The proposed TA Project will also consider providing technical assistance in the upper-middle-income countries (“UMICs”) such as Botswana, Equatorial Guinea, Gabon, Mauritius, Namibia, and South Africa.

CN - DFC will provide an eight-year direct loan of up to \$20,000,000 to Satya MicroCapital Limited (“Satya”) to expand its microfinance portfolio, using the joint liability group microfinance methodology of lending to poor, predominantly rural women in India (the “Project”). The Project will advance U.S. Government foreign policy priorities within India by promoting private-sector-led economic growth for underserved populations by increasing financing for income-generating activities for rural unbanked and underbanked micro borrowers within the country.

CN - DFC will provide an up to 12-year direct loan of up to \$10,000,000, including a \$7,500,000 senior loan and \$2,500,000 mezzanine loan, to Stichting Custodian BIX2 (“BIX2”), an investment vehicle that is targeting an \$80,000,000 total capitalization. BIX2 lends to enterprises generating carbon and other impact credits, such as clean cookstove manufacturers and clean water companies, which helps these businesses scale and helps grow the market for impact credits such as gender and health. BIX2 will expand on the investment strategy implemented in the first BIX fund, which DFC (then OPIC) supported with a \$5 million loan in 2018. This Project will advance U.S. development and foreign policy objectives by helping strengthen climate resilience and improve living conditions for base-of-the-pyramid communities at risk to political and economic destabilization.

CN - DFC will provide an up to 30-year political risk insurance contract with a contingent liability in an amount of up to \$1,000,000,000 (plus associated interest on the value of the insured debt, the “Insured Debt”) to a special purpose vehicle (the “Policyholder”) to be established by Standard Chartered Bank (“SCB”) to support a debt conversion (the “Debt Conversion”) of an estimated \$1.045 billion of outstanding eurobonds that is expected to generate approximately \$348 million to support resilient agricultural value chains, promote sustainable economic development, and improve food security in Egypt (the “Project”). The Debt Conversion will also improve Egypt’s external foreign currency-denominated sovereign debt profile.

CN - DFC will provide a 10-year direct loan of up to \$18,000,000 to Mufin Green Finance Limited (“Mufin”) to support the expansion of its loan and lease portfolio for electric vehicles utilized for commercial purposes in India (the “Project”). The Project advances the economic and strategic interests of the United States in India by addressing economic insecurity and inequality by providing access to finance for small businesses in India, particularly those that are unbanked or underbanked. This Project will support India's plan to expand electric vehicles while mitigating the environmental impacts of the transportation sector.

CN - DFC, in support of USAID/Serbia’s development objectives, will provide a 12-year loan portfolio guaranty (“LPG”) of up to \$48,000,000 to OTP Banka Srbija a.d. Novi Sad (“OTP”) to support lending to small businesses with at least 30 percent of total lending allocated to small businesses; 20 percent of total lending allocated to underdeveloped regions³ ; and 15 percent of total lending allocated to small businesses in the agricultural sector. This project advances U.S. development and foreign policy objectives by fostering equitable prosperity and by accelerating broad-based, inclusive, and sustainable economic growth through improved access to finance for small businesses in Serbia.

CN - DFC, in support of USAID/Serbia’s development objectives, will provide a 14-year loan portfolio guaranty of up to \$48,000,000 to NLB Komercijalna Banka a.d. Beograd (“NLBKB”) to support lending to small businesses with at least 30 percent of total lending allocated to small businesses in the agricultural sector; 30 percent of total lending allocated to 2X-qualifying small businesses; 15 percent of total lending allocated to small businesses that are in the Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy sectors³ ; and 10 percent of total lending allocated to small businesses in underserved regions.⁴ This project advances U.S. development and foreign policy objectives by fostering equitable prosperity and by accelerating broad-based, inclusive, and sustainable economic growth through improved access to finance for small businesses in Serbia.

CN - The Department of State is informing you of the intent to obligate Fiscal Year 2023 Assistance for Europe, Eurasia and Central Asia (AEECA) funds. This notification is being submitted on behalf of the Office of the Coordinator of U.S. Assistance to Europe and Eurasia (EUR/ACE). \$3,805,950. Armenia. Cybersecurity, Health and Economic Programs.

CN - The Department of State is informing you of its intent to obligate \$14,022,363 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 Nonproliferation, Anti-Terrorism, Demining, and Related Programs (NADR) Conventional Weapons Destruction (CWD) funds for programs described herein. This

notification is being submitted on behalf of the Bureau of Political-Military Affairs. Guinea-Bissau, Senegal, Global Capacity Development, MANPADS Recognition Training, Tajikistan, Ukraine, West Bank and Gaza.

CN - The funds will seek to overcome the prolonged political impasse and transitional governance process in Haiti, promoting meaningful Haitian-led dialogue among core political actors and influential groups while building the capacity of civil society to fully engage in the process, in support of implementation of the U.S. Strategy to Prevent Conflict and Promote Stability Haiti 10-year plan under the Global Fragility Act of 2019 (GFA). The planned activities are explained further in the attached enclosure. Haiti.

CN - The enclosed operating plan reflects a total of \$154,220,000 for FY 2024. The operating plan for State OIG includes \$106,835,000 appropriated by the FY 2024 Act, \$8,000,000 appropriated by the Ukraine Security Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2024 (Div. B, P.L. 118-50) (“the Ukraine Supplemental”), \$4,000,000 appropriated by the Israel Security Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2024 (Div. A, P.L. 118-50) (“the Israel Supplemental”), and \$10,550,000 in carryover. SIGAR’s operating plan includes \$24,835,000 in FY 2024 enacted funding.

CN - Consistent with section 705 of the United States Information and Educational Exchange Act of 1948 (“Smith-Mundt Act”), the Department of State is notifying you of its intent to obligate \$400,000 in FY 2024 Educational and Cultural Exchange (ECE) funds, pending the availability of funds, to support the Digital Connections Program. The planned activities are explained further in the attached enclosure. Digital Connections Program. Educational and Cultural Exchange Programs (ECE).

CN - DFC, in support of USAID/Rwanda’s development objectives, will provide a nine-year loan portfolio guaranty of up to \$20,000,000 (the “Loan Portfolio Guaranty”) to Bank of Kigali Plc (“BK”) to expand its portfolio of loans to individuals and non-sovereign, private small businesses in Rwanda, including small businesses in the agricultural value chain (the “Project”). The Loan Portfolio Guaranty will enable BK to implement its strategy of diversifying away from serving primarily corporate customers by increasing lending to the small business segments and the agriculture sector. This Project advances U.S. development and foreign policy priorities in Rwanda by supporting inclusive economic growth across the country.

CN - FY 2023 Section 1263 Indo-Pacific Maritime Security Initiative (MSI) Tranche Congressional Notification. The Department of Defense (DoD) is re-notifying the above-listed programs under the authority of Section 1263 of the NDAA for Fiscal Year (FY) 2016, as amended (under the heading “Indo-Pacific Maritime Security Initiative”) (Section 1263). DoD will provide security sector assistance to the recipient countries identified below through the execution of a regional maritime security program under Section 1263. DoD is renotifying the SeaVision Regional program in order to add an additional Vietnamese unit that will receive subscription services and training. DoD is renotifying the FY 2021 and FY 2022 CENTRIXS programs to change the Philippines Navy units that will receive communications and electronics equipment and accessories.

CN - Pursuant to section 634A of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (FAA), and sections 7015(c) and (f) of the Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 2022 (Div.
