Dear Chairperson Lofgren and Ranking Member Davis,

As required by Section 501 of House Resolution 756 from the 116th Congress, agreed to by the House on March 10, 2020, I am submitting this quarterly report: Adopting Standardized Formats for Legislative Documents.

Legislative branch staff continue to work on the second phase of the COMPS in USLM Project to convert legacy Statute Compilation files into Beta USLM XML and provide access to those files on the Government Publishing Office's (GPO) govinfo system.

This second phase involves performing data-modeling activities and creating transforms to convert the Compilations into Beta USLM XML. We have completed initial integration activities with the govinfo system and are nearing completion of data-modeling and transform activities. Legislative branch staff are on track to complete this project in 2021. For reference and additional background on the project, we have attached our previous report.

Additionally, the Committee knows that we continue to work with GPO and the Library of Congress to release additional legislative information when possible. As described in its December 9, 2020, press release, GPO released 10 additional years of Bill Status XML Bulk

Data on govinfo. The new data, which includes bill status information from 2003 to 2013 (108th to 112th Congresses), has been populated on GPO's govinfo Bulk Data Repository and adds to previously available data from 2013 to 2021 (113th to 116th Congresses). Bill status information describes activities and status steps for each legislative measure. Much of the House bill status information originates from the Legislative Information Management System (LIMS), which my office manages and operates, and is made available on the Congress.gov and govinfo websites.

Adopting Standardized Formats for Legislative Documents

As required by Section 501 of House Resolution 756, agreed to by the House on March 10, 2020, the Clerk of the House submits this quarterly report about adopting standardized formats for legislative documents.

As described in the initial report, the House is standardizing its formats for legislative documents using XML (Extensible Markup Language).¹ A stable “First-Generation” schema is in use while we continue to implement the “Second-Generation” XML called USLM (United States Legislative Markup).

The current USLM-related project work involves the Statute Compilations data set maintained by the House Office of the Legislative Counsel (HOLC). Each Statute Compilation incorporates the amendments made to the underlying statute since it was originally enacted. The Government Publishing Office (GPO) leads this project with the assistance of the Office of the Clerk, the Offices of the House and Senate Legislative Counsels, the Secretary of the Senate, and other staff from the Legislative Branch XML Working Group and the House Bulk Data Task Force.

The overall goal of this effort is to provide a uniform set of laws in USLM to enable downstream processes and increase efficiencies. The goal of the first phase was to make the Statute Compilations available on GPO’s online repository govinfo.gov in PDF format, and more than 2,000 Compilations are currently available on govinfo. The second phase is currently underway to convert legacy Statute Compilation files into Beta USLM XML and provide access to those files on govinfo. This phase involves performing data-modeling activities and creating transforms to convert the Compilations into Beta USLM XML. It is anticipated that this project will be completed in 2021.

The “More Documents in USLM” roadmap is included below. We expect to work with GPO and other stakeholders on a project proposal for next steps after the completion of the Statute Compilations project.
